Read the passage. Then answer the questions.

The Empire State Building

It has seen countless marriage proposals. It has been visited by millions of tourists. It has even had a giant gorilla climb up its side. While it is no longer the world's tallest skyscraper, it is still the most famous. The Empire State Building in New York City is an architectural masterpiece. It is also a historic attraction.

Even during the 1930s, when many people were out of work, New Yorkers expected their city to keep growing. It was then that a race began between Walter Chrysler (head of Chrysler Corporation) and John Raskob (founder of General Motors) to see who could build the world's tallest building. Each wanted to have his name and company associated with a building that would be world famous. Raskob's dream became the Empire State Building. Although smaller, the lovely Chrysler Building is still a landmark.

The saying "A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step" applies to the Empire State Building. First, architectural drawings were made. Amazingly, these took only two weeks to complete. This was because the architects used the designs of two big buildings that had already been built as a starting point. One of these buildings was the Reynolds Building in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. The other building was the Carew Tower in Cincinnati, Ohio. Construction began on March 17, 1930. There were 3,400 workers that contributed to the job. Observers were stunned when they saw the speed at which the huge structure went up. The building rose at a rate of four and a half stories per week! The building was completed faster than people thought it could be. It took only 401 days. In that time, over seven million man hours were invested in the building. It was a huge job, but it was completed very quickly.

No building had ever been more than 100 stories tall. When the workers added the 102nd story to the Empire State Building, the world gasped in amazement. The building was 1,250 feet tall, measuring to the top of the roof. Measuring to the top of the antennae spire, it was 1,454 feet tall.

On May 1, 1931, President Hoover officially opened the Empire State Building. He did this by pressing a symbolic "on" button in Washington, D.C. (The lights were actually turned on by someone at the building!) As the first

visitors streamed into the three-story-high marble lobby, they were astonished. They learned that the building had more than 70 miles of pipes, two and a half million feet of electrical wire, and 6,500 windows. It cost \$40,948,900 to build. Even though that is a lot of money, it was actually only half of what it should have cost because of the Great Depression. This is because the prices of things fell during the depression. Many people wanted to see the view from the top floor. They were given quite a choice! They could climb the 1,860 steps from the lobby to the 102nd floor, or they could take one of the 73 high-speed elevators.

Film crews lined up to use the magnificent building in their movies. Over 90 movies have been filmed at the Empire State Building. In one of the most famous movies, the giant ape King Kong climbs the outside of the structure.

At the same time, the Empire State Building became a symbol of New York glamour. After several romantic movies were filmed on its observation deck, the building became a popular place for marriage proposals. At certain times of the year, couples can even be married on the 102nd floor.

Many tourists still come to see the Empire State Building. In fact, about four million people visit the observation decks on the 86th and 102nd floors each year. On a clear day, visitors can see parts of New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, and Massachusetts. The Empire State Building is a beautiful reminder of John Raskob's vision. He proved that even during the Great Depression, dreams could come true.
